

Word Counts (JEQ, A&EL, and CFTM)

Certain journals use word counts to ensure concise writing or journal standards. The process for how word counts are processed varies by journal, though the way they are calculated is the same across all journals. Word counts do not include titles, author lists, affiliations, keywords, abbreviations, any disclaimers (such as funding, data availability, etc.) or acknowledgments, or references. All figures and tables are counted as 300 words each.

Journal of Environmental Quality

For the *Journal of Environmental Quality*, headquarters staff will complete a word count as part of their initial processing immediately after a paper is submitted. The word count will be added to the manuscript, and if it is over 7,000 words, the manuscript will be flagged with the blue circle “over word count” flag. The editor will then review the manuscript to verify if word count is an issue. If it is not, they will remove the flag and move the paper forward as usual. If the word count is too high for peer review, the editor will unsubmit the manuscript to return it to the author for changes.

Note: Certain paper types are excluded from the 7,000-word limit, including Reviews & Analysis, Dataset Papers, Environmental Issues, and certain special section papers.

Agricultural & Environmental Letters

For *Agricultural & Environmental Letters*, the editor runs a word count as part of their initial manuscript review after the paper is assigned to them. If the paper is over the 2,500-word limit, the paper is sent back to the author for revisions.

Crop, Forage, & Turfgrass Management

For *Crop, Forage & Turfgrass Management*, headquarters staff will complete a word count as part of their initial processing immediately after a paper is submitted. The word count will be added to the manuscript for editor review.
